Week six of the Spring Term:

This week in worship we have been thinking about how we encourage other people to reach our goals. We learned about the disciple Barnabas, who was one of the very earliest followers of Jesus and a leader of the early church. His real name was Joseph and he was given his new name of Barnabas by those who knew him well; it means 'son of encouragement'. He encouraged Paul to continue his ministry in the face of immense challenges, which led to the rise of Christianity across Europe and the Middle East.

We thought about how we could encourage our friends and family when they had challenges to face too.

Reverend Bryn came into school on Wednesday to lead our worship. He told us all about Psalm 23, 'The Lord is my Shepherd'. We learned that there are 150 psalms, or songs, in the Bible, and these can support us in different ways when we need to ask for help, for courage, for forgiveness or to give thanks.

Our international greeting this week has been 'Bonjour tout le monde' – in keeping with our Modern Foreign Language teaching of French, to our KS2 children.

Thanks again to Lucy's grandma for her huge efforts with this.


World Book Day

IS MY CHILD TOO ILL FOR SCHOOL?

until...

CHICKENPOX	At least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over.
DIARRHOEA AND VOMITING	48 hours after their last episode.
HIGH TEMPERATURE	if your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.
IMPETIGO	Their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics.
MEASLES	4 days after the rash first appeared.
MUMPS	5 days after their swelling started.
SCABIES	They've had their first treatment.
SCARLET FEVER	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics.
WHOOPING COUGH	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics.

- a towel,
